## Emergency Rules Developed in Collaborative State Agency Partnership



## Emergency Rules are Intended to:

- 1. Update statutory definitions of discipline that are in alignment with current law
- 2. Require school boards to establish policies for reporting and notification when classroom exclusions occur
- 3. Clarify the scope of authority for teachers when administering classroom exclusions
- 4. Make evident the standards and procedures that educators must follow to maintain an optimal learning environment for all students
- 5. Promote the involvement of families as integral partners in helping students to be successful
- 6. Ensure manageable data and reporting requirements from each level of the system, where applicable (i.e., classroom, school, district, state, etc.)



# Washington State Legislation



## Revised Code of Washington (RCW)

## - LAWS -

- Enacted by State Legislature and signed by the Governor
- Enacted by voters (initiatives & referendums)

## Washington Administrative Code (WAC)

## - REGULATIONS -

- Issued by state agencies
- Provides structure and clarity for what is and isn't allowed under state law



## Key Changes within the Emergency Rulemaking


- **Replaces "Emergency Expulsion" with "Emergency Removal"** per RCW 28A.600.495.
- Clarifies the definition of classroom exclusion.
- Includes the definitions of discretionary and non-discretionary discipline from RCW 28A.600.015(6).
- Removed language "Other Forms of Discipline" and added the definition of non-disciplinary action and corrective action.
- **References RCWs related to professional standards** of educator certification and renewal, Teacher and Principal Evaluation Criterion and Frameworks (**TPEP**), and Cultural Competency Diversity Equity and Inclusion Standards (**CCDEI**).
- Requires school districts and school boards to revisit their district policies and procedures so that all staff work cooperatively toward consistent enforcement of proper student behavior throughout each school as well as within each classroom.

## Emergency Rulemaking on Discipline Laws under WAC Chapter 392-400

#### Classroom Exclusions WAC 392-400-330

- Expanded language for clarity.
- Included language from the RCW about attempting corrective action vs. referencing RCW
- Removed the language "brief duration"

Classroom Exclusion Notice and Procedure WAC 392-400-335

 Clarified responsibilities of LEAs in alignment with best practice. Removed language "other forms of discipline" from three WAC's

- WAC 392-400-435 Shortterm and in-school suspension.
- WAC 392-400-440 Longterm suspensions.
- WAC 392-400-445 Expulsions.



## WAC 392-400-025: Definitions Corrective Action

#### **Corrective Action**

Disciplinary and Non-disciplinary actions taken by a certificated educator

Disciplinary Action Discretionary and Nondiscretionary Discipline

#### **Non-disciplinary Action**

Evidence-based interventions and support outlined in RCW to support the student in meeting behavioral expectations

#### RCW 28A.410.270

Professional educator knowledge, skill, and performance standards

#### RCW 28A.405.100

TPEP evaluation of classroom management

# WAC 392-400-025: Definitions Discretionary vs. Nondiscretionary Discipline

#### Discretionary

A disciplinary action taken by a school district for student behavior that violates rules of student conduct adopted by a school district board of directors under RCW 28A.600.015(6). Discretionary discipline **does** not include evidence-based interventions and support outlined in RCW 28A.410.270, 28A.405.100, and 28A.410.260 to support the student in meeting behavioral expectations.

#### Nondiscretionary

(a) Violations of RCW 28A.600.420; (b) An offense listed in RCW 13.04.155; (c) Two or more violations of RCW 9A.46.120, 9.41.280, 28A.600.455, 28A.635.020, or 28A.635.060 within a three-year period; or (d) Behavior that adversely impacts the health or safety of other students or educational staff. RCW 28A.600.015.

# WAC 392-400-330: Classroom Exclusions

A teacher may exclude a student from the teacher's individual classroom and instructional or activity area while the student is under the teacher's immediate supervision, subject to district policy and procedure requirements established in WAC 392-400-110. Except in emergency circumstances, the teacher first must attempt one or more alternative forms of corrective action.

Discretionary discipline leading to a classroom exclusion as determined by the school district's written procedures per RCW 28A.600.010 must give the highest consideration to the judgment of qualified certificated educators regarding the conditions necessary to maintain the optimum learning

experience

<u>A classroom exclusion</u> <u>does not include actions</u> <u>that result in missed</u> instruction when A teacher or other school personnel uses **evidencebased classroom management practices outlined in RCW 28A.410.270, 28A.405.100, and 28A.410.260** to support the student in meeting behavioral expectations; and

The student remains under the supervision of the teacher or other school personnel



# WAC 392-400-330: Classroom Exclusions



A classroom exclusion that exceeds this time period, and if such students have repeatedly disrupted the learning of other students, may be considered a suspension in accordance with this chapter and must provide for early involvement of parents in attempts to improve the student's behavior.



Duration of classroom exclusion.

A classroom exclusion may be administered for all or any portion of the balance of the school day, or up to the following two days, or until the principal or designee and teacher have conferred, **whichever occurs first**.



The procedures shall assure, pursuant to RCW 28A.400.110, that **all staff work cooperatively toward consistent enforcement of proper student behavior throughout each school, as well as within each classroom.**
