



































Desired Behavior

Problem Behavior




Put back home

Problem

What: Escalating from foot pound to pants grab, to hand biting

Where: Mainly BTS (occasionally on stage, but

rare)

When: Primarily during AM weighing

Who: Primarily non-primary trainers

Why: Food is tossed



Soren-Barn Owl

Problem

What: Head bouncing/footing and gets

"breedy"

Where: At home

When: In winter months

Who: Everyone, some more predictably than

others





Cortez – Blue and Gold Macaw

Problem

What: Bites the hand he's on.

Where: On stage, sometimes BTS.

When: Immediately after completing the

"Elvis"

Who: Everyone that asked for, and got, the behavior

Why: ??? We never figured this one out.



Aussie – Laughing Kookaburra

Problem

What: Lunging at trainer's faces and biting them in the ear, eye brown ridge, lips, or bridge of nose.

Where: Inside her mew, from perches and the hand

When: During AM weighing, after telemetry ankle buwet is secured, during kennel training sessions. Gets worse in spring and fall.

Who: Almost exclusively non-primary trainers
