





U.S. Population Breakdown




Legal Profession Breakdown (gender)


Resident Active Attorney Demographics: Gender (ABA National Lawyer Population Survey, 2020)




Legal Profession Breakdown (race/ethnicity)


Minority Law Students by State






Diversity on the U.S. Supreme Court


Only THREE of the 115 justices to ever serve on the U.S. Supreme Court have been LAWYERS OF COLOR.




Sitting Federal Courts of Appeal Judges




% of SITTING female Federal Courts of Appeal Judges (by CIRCUIT)




% of Federal Courts of Appeal Judges OF COLOR (by CIRCUIT)




Demography of all ARTICLE III Judges




% of all FEMALE State Supreme Court Justices




% of State Supreme Court Justices OF COLOR



First Chair at Trial in CIVIL Cases



76% of lead counsel were men

59% of civil cases had men as lead counsel for *both* plaintiff and defendant.

87% of class actions have male lead counsel

71% of class actions had male lead counsel for *both* plaintiff and defendant.




% of Lead Counsel Who Were WOMEN


As lead counsel in areas of practice that are the biggest \$\$ cases, women lag far behind.








"...is critical to the legitimacy of our judicial system and the rule of law. If our justice system does not reflect the diversity of our community, it will lose credibility..."

"...is important to a law firm's bottom line... firms that appreciate and embrace diversity...will be best positioned to attract...diverse clientele and thrive.




Diversity in Law Firms (PARTNERS)


