Duty to Report

The State Medical Board of Ohio continues to grow and learn from the lessons of the past. As it reviews cases from the last 25 years, it has now been given the opportunity to strengthen its regulation and case protocol. As a high priority, the board is addressing the duty to report mandate with renewed vigor and has developed strategies to effectively educate licensees and further protect victims when violations of the Medical Practice Act occur.

Medical Board has emphasized the importance of duty to report in the licensing process. On December 11, 2019, the board voted to add an attestation to every application and renewal as a reminder to licensees of their duty to report:

Reporting violations to the Medical Board is an important responsibility for all Ohiolicensed practitioners. The board has developed a strategic education plan that includes physicians and podiatrists, medical students, allied health professionals, the medical community (hospitals, health care systems, etc.) and other health care boards.

To disseminate this important information, the board will employ a variety of tactics:

Do you acknowledge your personal duty to report to the State Medical Board of Ohio when you believe that any individual licensed by the board has violated the board's laws or rules?


Violations include, but are not limited to, sexual misconduct, impairment, practice below the minimal standards of care, and improper prescribing of controlled substances.

Reports of misconduct to supervisors, law enforcement or health care system management do NOT fulfill your duty to report to the State Medical Board of Ohio; failure to report could result in formal disciplinary action.

DUTY TO REPORT

- *Presentations:* As part of outreach efforts, board staff will deliver tailored presentations to practitioners across the state, making sure they know their responsibility and the support system the board has in place. Duty to report slides also will be incorporated into any presentation delivered by board staff, regardless of the topic. This has already taken place with medical school presentations.
- *Posters:* Visual reminders are powerful tools to reinforce important messaging. The board will create and share posters with the imperative to report violations of the Medical Practice Act and the needed resources to contact the appropriate parties.
 - *Promotional merchandise*: The board will create a succinct message with a hotline phone number to put on branded note pads and distribute the materials as needed to practitioners.
 - *Video:* To improve the messaging efforts, the board plans to create an educational video as a resource to practitioners that can also be shared with other state health care boards in Ohio and customized to their licensees.


