Uniqueness of Career Journey

Some years later, I was opening a new restaurant and was invited to a high school hospitality class to speak on finding your passions, making career choices, and defining success for oneself. At the end of the day, San Diego Unified offered me a position.

I spent three years teaching event planning, hospitality marketing, culinary arts management, and business/ IT at an alternative school in the inner city. Over 20 years later, I have taught both FCS and Business/Marketing in 3 school districts in three states.

Inspiration for Career Choice

The two responsibilities, before any others, are 1 – to keep students safe and feeling secure and 2 – helping prepare for the world beyond the classroom. My 3rd responsibility is facilitating students' definition of success for their own lives.

Skills Vital to Success in Career

Being open to the experiences and “left turns”; communicate, admit when you don't know something, be flexible, learning who to ask and what to ask. It doesn't matter what career you are in, these skills are a must.

Best Advice to Someone Considering This Career

Recommended Educational Preparation
